HEPATITIS A IS SPREADING

Always wash your hands! Especially after eating, using the restroom, and before preparing food



Hepatitis A is a potentially life-threatening liver disease caused by a virus found in feces (poop) of infected people. It can easily spread from person-to-person and symptoms can last a few weeks to many months.

How is it spread?

How can you prevent hepatitis A?

- Get the Hepatitis A vaccine
- Don't have sex with someone who has hepatitis A
- Use your own towels, toothbrushes, and eating utensils
- Don't share food, drinks, or smokes with other people





What to do if you suspect hepatitis A?

Food Service Worker

- · Wear gloves when handling food
- If you have symptoms, DO NOT GO TO WORK, GO TO THE DOCTOR
- Tell your manager right away

Medical Provider if you suspect your patient has hepatitis A

- Run hepatitis A IgM antibody test
- Collect an extra tube of blood (red top) for public health. Spin it, and store frozen. If hepatitis A IgM is positive, your health department will provide instructions for molecular testing
- Complete acute hepatitis A questionnaire with patient
- Report cases of hepatitis A to (270) 781-8039 EXT. 126 or 183

You are more likely to be infected if you:

- use drugs (injection, non-injection, or marijuana)
- have sex with an infected person
- live with or have close contact with an infected person
- touch or eat food or drink that someone with hepatitis A has handled
